Early Education STEAM center to open toddler classroom

A grand opening and ribbon-cutting for the newest classroom in the Marshall University Early Education STEAM Center will take place at 4:30 p.m. Friday, Nov. 3, at the center, which is located in Corbly Hall on Marshall's Huntington campus.

The newly renovated classroom is designed for toddler-aged children ages 2 to 3 years old. Children of Marshall faculty, staff and students receive priority registration. Space is available for 12 children during the operating hours of 7:45 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Monday through Friday.

"We welcome the Marshall community and the greater Huntington community to celebrate with us and to learn more about our program," said Dr. Maggie Luma, chief of staff for the June Harless Center, which operates the STEAM Center. "We believe that opening new, high-quality child care options invites a diverse workforce to the area and benefits our local economy."

Luma added that by inviting pre-service teachers and graduate assistants from Marshall's College of Education and Professional Development to work and observe in the center's classrooms benefits the future teaching workforce.

This event is expected to be approximately one hour long and will include the ribbon-cutting, a welcome from the center's director, networking with light refreshments, and a tour of the new space.

Visiting Writers Series continues with Castro

The A.E. Stringer Visiting Writers Series continues this fall with Joy Castro on Thursday, Nov. 2, in the Drinko Library Atrium on the Huntington campus. In celebration of Hispanic Heritage Month, Marshall's Department of English, College of Liberal Arts, Honors College and University Libraries present the award-winning author of *Flight Risk*.

Castro's *Flight Risk* was a 2022 finalist for International Thriller Award; her post-Katrina

New Orleans literary thriller *Hell or High Water* received the Nebraska Book Award and her novel *Nearer Home* was published in France by Gallimard's historic Série Noire. Castro was also honored for a story collection *How Winter Began*, the memoir *The Truth Book* and the essay collection *Island of Bones*, which received the International Latino Book Award.

Dr. Sara Henning, assistant professor of English and coordinator of the Stringer Visiting Writers Series at Marshall, organized the reading.

"Joy is an exceptional writer who spent many of her formative years in West Virginia, and I am so grateful that she will be sharing her work with our students and larger campus community," Henning said. "I believe that our students will connect not only with Joy's Appalachian roots, but with her hard-won path to success. As a first-generation college student, she has risen to become one of the most beloved Latinx literary voices of our time."

Castro is also the editor of the craft anthology *Family Trouble: Memoirists on the Hazards and Rewards of Revealing Family* and the founding series editor of Machete, a series in innovative literary nonfiction at The Ohio State University Press. She's the former Writer-in-Residence at Vanderbilt University, and currently the Willa Cather Professor of English and Ethnic Studies at the University of Nebraska-Lincoln where she directs the institute for Ethnic Studies.



Marshall to host Connection Trio

The School of Music will present an evening concert and an afternoon workshop on Brazilian instrumental music with Connection Trio, on Tuesday, Nov. 7.

The workshop will be at 2 p.m. Nov. 7 in Smith Recital Hall. The concert will be at 7:30 p.m. the same day in Smith Recital Hall. Both are free and open to all.

Connection Trio is made up of pianist Daniel Baker, flutist Davson de Souza and guitarist Vinicius Vianna, whose performances celebrate Brazilian instrumental music. The Brazilian musical group combines classical music and jazz with regional influences, incorporating elements of bossa nova, samba, choro and traditional music to take listeners on a musical journey.





Marshall Health grows its team of cardiologists

Cardiologists <u>George J. Linsenmeyer III, M.D.</u> (left), and <u>Zachary O. Curtis, M.D</u>., have joined the Marshall Health Network.

Linsenmeyer brings more than 40 years of experience as an interventional cardiologist, much of which was in private practice, to his new role as an associate professor of cardiovascular services at the Marshall University Joan C. Edwards School of Medicine and Marshall Health.

He earned his medical degree from West Virginia University in Morgantown, West Virginia, followed by internal medicine residencies at St. Louis (Missouri) University Group Hospitals and West Virginia University in Charleston. He also completed a cardiology fellowship at the University of Cincinnati (Ohio). He previously served as governor for the West Virginia Chapter of the American College of Cardiology and a member of several national committees for the American College of Cardiology and the Society for Cardiac Angiography and Intervention.

Linsenmeyer is certified by the American Board of Internal Medicine, with subspecialty certifications in cardiovascular disease and interventional cardiology, and the Board of Nuclear Cardiology. He is also certified in thoracic echocardiography by the National Board of Echocardiography. He is accepting new patients at Marshall Cardiology, an outpatient department of Cabell Huntington Hospital, at 1249 15th Street in Huntington. For appointments, call 304-691-8500.

As a hospital-based cardiologist, Curtis has been named an assistant professor of cardiovascular services at the Joan C. Edwards School of Medicine. He primarily sees patients at Cabell Huntington Hospital and St. Mary's Medical Center. Curtis earned his medical degree from Trinity School of Medicine in Ribishi, St. Vincent and the Grenadines, followed by an internal medicine residency and cardiology fellowship at the Joan C. Edwards School of Medicine. He is certified by the American Board of Internal Medicine. His specialties are non-interventional invasive cardiology, echocardiography and cardiac critical care.

Jerry R. Keyser Scholarship established for biology majors at Marshall University

The Marshall University Foundation Inc. has announced the establishment of the Jerry R. Keyser Scholarship for \$300,000 designed to support and nurture aspiring biology majors at Marshall University. The scholarship is endowed by Jerry Keyser.

Of the \$300,000, \$250,000 will be put into the foundation's endowment, with the remaining \$50,000 going toward an expendable portion, with \$10,000 per year to be awarded for the first five years. The renewable, four-year scholarship aims to foster the growth of exceptional talents and empower the next generation of scientific leaders

who will make groundbreaking contributions to the field of biology and environmental sciences.

"I have heard the inner calling of my faith to give this generous contribution to Marshall University," Keyser said. "I have been blessed to have had a successful business career enabling me to contribute to the scholarship fund and give back to those residents of West Virginia who wish to work hard to further their education and make a difference.

"It is my intent and hope these scholarships be awarded to those who want to pursue a degree in biological science to develop careers in researching natural and metabolic treatments for cancer and other diseases. Also, environmental science to help preserve our environment."

Keyser was born and grew up in West Virginia and attended Marshall University where he received his bachelor's degree in social studies in 1971. After a successful business career, Keyser traveled the country where he developed a love for art and the outdoors. Toward the end of his career, Keyser began to pursue his passion for painting, particularly of the Rocky Mountains and western landscapes.

"I had a great time while attending Marshall and made many long-lasting friends," Keyser said. "After college, I moved away from West Virginia to other places to pursue my corporate business goals. I am now retired and reside in Montana and Colorado. I often attend Marshall's Homecoming weekend to see old friends. It always brings back old memories of when I attended school, and how much I miss the people and beautiful places in the Mountain State. Marshall University and West Virginia have a special and deep place in my heart."

The Jerry R. Keyser Scholarship was established to support undergraduate students in the College of Science. First preference goes to biology majors, and second preference goes to

environmental science majors. The award is renewable as long as the recipient maintains a good academic standing.
