53rd annual Memorial Fountain Ceremony features author with personal ties to the tragedy

November 14, 2023



On a rainy night on Nov. 14, 1970, Southern Airways Flight 932 crashed into a hillside as it approached Tri-State Airport, carrying 75 Thundering Herd coaches, teammates, staff, supporters and flight crew members. Had Craig T. Greenlee not made the decision to walk away from the team the previous season, he would have likely been part of that devastating number.

Yesterday at the annual memorial service, he shared his perspective on what happened leading up to and after the crash and how the accident still resonates with so many people to this day.

He believes the tragedy brought the Huntington community together during a time when racial tensions were high.

"There's no question in my mind that the plane crash averted what could have been a bloody race riot at Marshall," said Greenlee. "The situation was just that volatile, but the crash was so shocking, any beef between blacks and whites became meaningless. The hurt and devastation was all-encompassing."

Just 13 months before the crash, Greenlee decided he would not be returning the next season.

"The passion, the drive and the hunger to compete and excel was no longer there. If you're going to be any good at football, you've got to be all in. If you're not, you're going to get laid out. It was time for me to place my total focus on school and get that degree."

While Greenlee was not an active member of the team in 1970, many of his friends on campus were those he made on the football field. The crash was a shocking blow in the heart of his junior year.

"The only things that mattered were finding ways to console one another and figure out what we would do about attending as many funerals as possible," said Greenlee. "Even now, a half century and few years later, the memories of Nov. 14, 1970 still resonate strongly. It still tugs at the heartstrings in a mighty way after all this time."

Greenlee says he did make a brief comeback after the crash to play during the spring of '71, mostly because he felt compelled to contribute in some way as a salute to his former teammates who perished in the crash.

"I even got my starting position back as a safety," said Greenlee. "But once preseason practice started with the Young Thundering Herd in August '71, I knew time had come for me to hang up the cleats for good. I turned in my gear and never looked back."

Still, every year on Nov. 14, his thoughts drift to those tough moments when the crash happened, shattering the campus and community.

"This is a shared experience that has absolutely nothing to do with race or gender," said Greenlee. "Just like we share the same air, we share the same sorrow and we share the same sense of wonderment and satisfaction in seeing how the football program has not only survived, but thrived."

In 2011, Greenlee published a book on the tragedy, titled "November Ever After: A memoir of tragedy and triumph in the wake of the 1970 Marshall football plane crash." He says he chose to write the book after watching "We Are Marshall" left him wishing for more of the true story of what happened, without any added Hollywood frills.

Greenlee is semi-retired, residing in Winston-Salem, North Carolina, with his wife of 24 years, Cynthia. He also has five children and seven grandchildren.

Marshall Marketplace information session and project update to take place Dec. 12

Earlier this year, it was announced that Marshall University would be adopting a "Save to Serve" culture to eliminate waste and inefficiencies through a shared governance accountability model and by investing in e-procurement capabilities. As part of this process, the Office of Purchasing is implementing a new e-procurement solution by Unimarket that will streamline and standardize the procure-to-pay processes on campus. This new system, called the **Marshall Marketplace**, will be implemented this spring.

Over the last several months, the Office of Purchasing has been busy preparing for these upcoming changes. This has included working with Huron Consulting on the pre-planning process.

In addition, the Office of Purchasing has been working on the backend to make the necessary changes and updates in Banner to prepare for the launch of the Marshall Marketplace. This includes the scrubbing of current vendor lists, codes, users, ORGS, etc. Next, the Office of Purchasing will begin identifying existing contracts for the vendor catalog.

Existing purchasing policies and procedures are being reviewed and revised to align with the new e-procurement processes and a communications plan is being created to ensure proper notification of these changes. Updates will be provided throughout the implementation process via the We Are Marshall newsletter, campus email and on the purchasing website at www.marshall.edu/purchasing/marketplace.

The Office of Purchasing has planned information sessions for 10 a.m. and 2 p.m. on Tuesday, Dec. 12 to go over the project goals, status and timeline and to address any questions or concerns. These identical sessions will be available both in-person in Drinko Library 349 and virtually via Microsoft Teams.

Focus teams are also being created for early 2024. These teams will participate in testing and providing feedback prior to the launch of the Marshall Marketplace.

Internal medicine nurse practitioner fellowship now accepting applications for 2024

The <u>internal medicine nurse practitioner fellowship program</u> at Marshall Health and the Joan C. Edwards School of Medicine is now accepting applications for its 2024-2025 cohort.

The fellowship provides one year of postgraduate training for nurse practitioners looking to transition into a new specialty or hone their skills in a specific area of practice. Fellows work closely with physicians, other nurse practitioners, pharmacists, resident physicians and internal medicine subspecialty fellows from the Joan C. Edwards School of Medicine to grow professional expertise in clinical care, research, leadership, didactics and teamwork. Rotations in general internal medicine and cardiology are required. Elective rotations include endocrinology, gastroenterology, nephrology, infectious disease and pulmonology.

Eligible applicants must have graduated from an accredited Nurse Practitioner Master of Science in Nursing (M.S.N.) or Doctor of Nurse Practitioner (D.N.P.) program 18 months prior to the start of the fellowship on October 1, 2024. National board certification must be obtained by August 1, 2024. Applications must be submitted online no later than Monday, March 4, 2024. Applicants selected for interviews will be scheduled in March and April, with the final selection of fellows in April.

The program will host a series of upcoming virtual open houses for applicants to learn more about the program:





MAMC offering in-demand classes via Skills Exchange

November 14, 2023



As part of Marshall's efforts to deliver on-demand access to in-demand knowledge, the Marshall Advanced Manufacturing Center (MAMC) is offering an array of popular courses through the university's new Marshall Skills Exchange.

The web portal includes both in-person and hands-on classes and online instruction as well as the ability to earn microcredentials.

Upcoming MAMC courses include:

- Fundamentals of Communication, Nov. 21, 1-4 p.m. online via Teams. The cost is \$129 per person.
- Conflict Resolution, Nov. 28, 1 p.m. to 4 p.m. online via Teams. The cost is \$129 per person.
- ISO 9001:2015 Internal Auditor Training, Jan. 9-12, 1-5 p.m. each day at MAMC Huntington (1050 Fourth Ave.) The cost is \$595 per person.

Other MAMC courses offered through the exchange include Certified CNC Lathe Operator; Certified CNC Mill Operator; Fundamentals of 3D Printing; Online Metrology; Online CNC Operator; Robotics in Manufacturing: Fundamentals; and Today's STEM Classroom: Projects and Best Practices.
