Dormitory Completion Is Rushed

A men's dorm and an engineering building are in various stages of completion.

The engineering building, at one time a Kroger store, cannot be used until money is received from the state to furnish it with necessary equipment and supplies. Until that time, all students of the College of Applied Scieres will meet in the old temporary building.

The future of this temporary annex is not known, but at some future date it probably will be removed from the campus.

The Men's dormitory is rapidly nearing completion and is expected to be ready for use during the next fall term. It will house 244 freshmen men and is equipped with dining facilities for all residents. Other features include living quarters for the hostess and a lounge with television and recreation areas.

Plans for additions to the present building will give housing to several hundred other male students in the future. The first four levels. The second addition will be a seven-story one added to the west end of the building.




