Dormitory Completion Is Rushed

A men's dorm and an engineering building are in various stages of completion.

The engineering building, at one time a Kroger store, cannot be used until money is received from the state to furnish it with necessary equipment and supplies. Until that time, all students of the College of Applied Sciences will meet in the old temporary building.

The future of this temporary annex is not known, but at some future date it probably will be removed from the campus.

The Men's dormitory is rapidly nearing completion and is expected to be ready for use during the next fall term. It will house 244 freshmen men and is equipped with dining facilities for all residents. Other features include living quarters for the hostess and a lounge with television and recreation areas.

Plans for additions to the present building will give housing to several hundred other male students in the future. The first addition will be the three storys added to the top of the original four levels. The second addition will be a seven-story one added to the west end of the building.

These new facilities are only two of the many which are planned for the future. Others include more housing for students, a possibility of a new Student Union, and a bomb shelter.

Former Officer Attends Senate

William Blevins, a former vice president of the Marshall student body, was guest at a special Senate session last week.

Mr. Blevins, a 1951 graduate, is now employment manager for the Equitable Life Assurance Company in New York. He was the main writer of the Marshall Student Government Constitution in 1950.

Before 1950, Marshall had only a student council, according to Mr. Blevins, which had not been changed much for 25 years. Meetings were informal and parliamentary procedure was not followed.

To correct this situation and to get more participation in the council, Blevins and a committee drew up a constitution.

They wrote to other colleges and universities in the country for copies of their constitutions and received 25 to 30 copies. From these they drew up a constitution similar to that of the national government.

Blevins congratulated the present senators on their parliamentary skills. He said that Student Government was good training for future work.

In Senate action that night, the appointments of Fred Charles, Huntington freshman and alternate senator, to full senator, and Jo Ann Mamula, Weirton freshman, to alternate senator, were ratified.

The Gilbert and Sullivan Concert Hall, featuring four outstanding singers, will be presented at the convocation tomorrow at 11 a.m. in Old Main Auditorium. This program of Gilbert and Sullivan presents various vignettes of the most popular of their operettas in full costume. The basic plots are set forth by song and dialogue in the essential Gilbert and Sullivan flavor.

Donald Johnson, baritone; John Carter, tenor; Ruth Ray, mezzo-soprano; and Lila Gage, soprano, will sing.

Johnson, producer of the program, has acquired a background in concert, opera, TV, and recording fields. He has made solo appearances at Carnegie Hall, Lewisohn Stadium, Robin Hood Dell, Hollywood Bowl, New York City Center Opera, and at Radio City Music Hall.

Carter, has been hailed by one of America's leading critics, Albert Goldberg, as the possessor of "A voice of polished tenor gold". He got his big break when he won the Metropolitan Auditions of the Air.

Since this time, Carter has starred on his own radio show and appeared countless times as guest star on radio and television.

Ruth Ray, who studied voice in France on a Fulbright Scholarship, has had a busy schedule of professional appearances with the Robert Shaw Chorale, several solo performances with leading symphonies, and a number of summer engagements with the Lyric Theatre at Finger Lakes, N. Y., and the Gilbert and Sullivan Festival Theatre at Monmouth, Maine.

Lila Gage began her career by winning the Griffith Award and the New York Singing Teacher's Award.

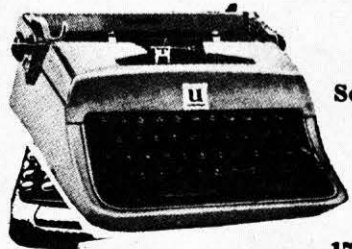

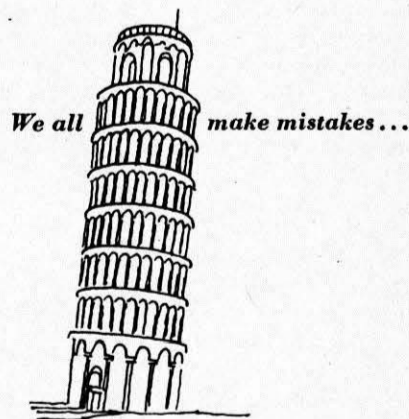
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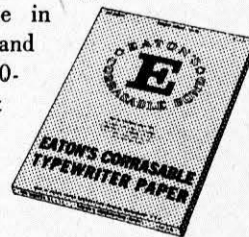
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Green Takes On Kent State Team

The Big Green takes on an improved Kent State five tonight on State's battleground.

In the last clash of the two teams, the Green had a rough time holding them down. Marshall went out to a 16 point lead early in the game, but Kent had other plans. They pulled within one point at half time.

In the second half State went ahead by as much as four points, but with seconds left in the game, Lew Mott dumped in a foul shot to win 73-72.

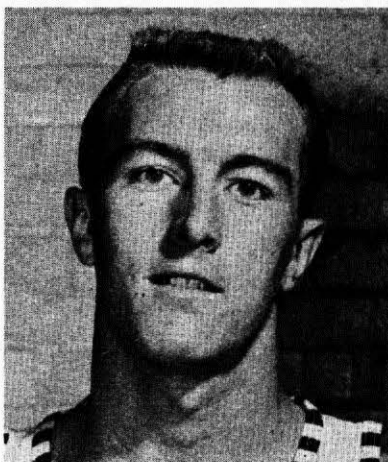
Last Saturday's clash with St. Francis was canceled because of bad weather conditions at Altoona Penn. The team planned to fly there Saturday but received news that the airport was closed.

The Big Green will be taking a 5-6 conference record into tonight's game. In order to have a .500 conference record they will have to post a win tonight.

The Big Green hopes to fly to St. Francis tonight after the Kent State game to take on the Frankies on their home court.

The Big Green has only two more games after tonight's clash. They will take on the University of Cincinnati at the Memorial Field House Saturday.

The Bearcats will be bringing a 16 game winning streak with

them. They have already clinched the Missouri Valley conference title by beating a weak North Texas State team. The Bearcats have been averaging well over the .400 mark from the floor and pulling down over 60 rebounds per game.

Eastern Kentucky Five Wins Over Big Green

Marshall's overall cage record now stands at 10 wins against 11 losses as the result of a Thursday night defeat at the hand of Eastern Kentucky by a 70-58 score.

The Big Green's game in the first half was the kind of ball playing they executed against Bowling Green last Monday night when they took over 4th place in the conference. But they began to falter in the last half and the Maroons took a lead which the Big Green couldn't regain. Marshall's average from the floor was 40 per cent in the first half but the slow second half pulled them down to 39 per cent for the game.

The Maroon's overall average was 44 per cent.

Three men from Marshall hit in double figures, Tex Williams had 17, Bruce Moody, 12 and Lou Mott, 11.

The Maroons had control of the boards as they pulled down 15 more rebounds than the Big Green. They also had four men in double figures with Phil Estep scoring 19 to take the honors for the evening.

Marshall's seasonal record stands now at 10 wins and 11 losses. The Big Green has only one MAC game left, which is against Kent State.

Netters Closing Tourney Soon

Intramural basketball season is rapidly drawing to a close. With eight teams remaining, the championship will be decided this week.

Of the eight teams, two remain undefeated, they are Sig Ep No. 2 and Point Express. All others have at least one or two defeats.

The tournament, which will be held this week, is a double elimination affair. In double elimination play, each team must lose two games to be out.

Teams with only one loss are; PKA No. 1 and the Hilltoppers. In last week's games, Sig Ep No. 1 handed the Old Timers their second defeat 56-53 and Virgil's Gang lost one to Varsity "M" 47-43. The Firehouse 5 forfeited to the Collegians 9-0.

In other action, Point Express dumped the Hilltoppers by 20 points 82-62 and Sig Ep squeezed by PKA 45-43.

The parings are Sig Ep. No. 1 vs. Rebels, Varsity "M" No. 3 vs. Collegians, PKA No. 1 will play the winner of the Sig Ep game and the Hilltoppers will take on the winner of the Varsity "M" game.

Four thousand copies were sent to high schools during the semester break. The booklet, prepared by the State Awareness Commission, aims to help high school students prepare themselves for college.

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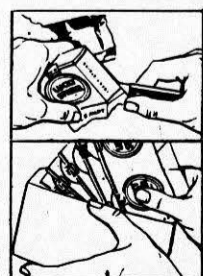
