Playing in a downpour of rain with the field in an execrable condition, the Marshall football team defeated the representatives of Broaddus College at Philippi by the score of twenty seven to nothing. Under favorable conditions, the score would have been much higher in our favor.

On the offense, "Dug" Freutal was Marshall's main stay, scoring three of the four touchdowns made. The remaining touchdown was made by Painter, who played a consistently good game throughout. The whole team starred on the defense, but "Wheatcake" Hatfield and Crawford are especially deserving of mention. Hatfield was in almost every play. Workman played a good game as usual. Davidson, Anderson, and Smith were not in the game, due to injuries received in the Morris Harvey fracas.

March, March On!

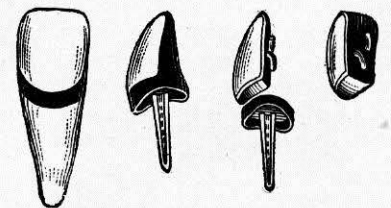
March, march on down the field,
