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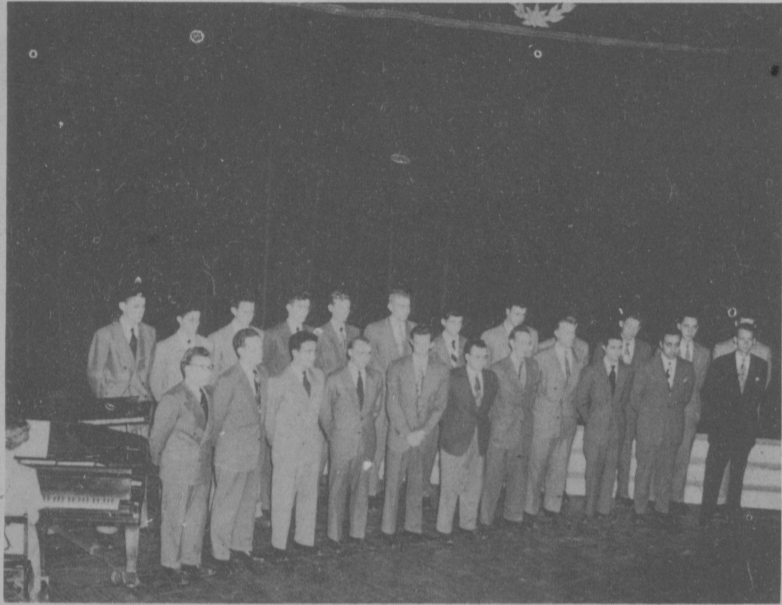

Study Of Mankind To Be Assembly Subject Thursday

Stuart Chase, writer and lecturer on economic and public affairs, will speak on a special assembly program at 10 A. M. tomorrow in the college auditorium. His topic will be "The Proper Study of Mankind".

Prof. Curtiss Baxter, manager of the series, said concerning Chase, "He is the foremost speaker on the assembly series that we have had this year."

Mr. Chase was born in New Hampshire, educated at Harvard and the Massachusetts Institute of Technology, and trained as an accountant. He practised this profession for some years, acquainting himself with the structure of many businesses, organizations, and government agencies.

He is the author of "Your Money's Worth", published in 1927 in collaboration with F. J. Schlink, "Men and Machines", "Rich Land Poor Land", "A New Deal" and "The Tyranny of Words".

His latest book, "The Proper Study of Mankind," surveys the general field of social science, compares it with physical science, and appraises its possibilities for solving the critical and crucial problems of the atomic age.

There will be a luncheon for Mr. Chase in the Dining Hall Thursday at 12.

NEW SCHOLARSHIP FOR WOMEN BEGINS NEXT SCHOOL YEAR

A scholarship for women for the academic year 1949-50 has been granted to Marshall College by the Business and Professional Woman's Club of Huntington, Luther E. Bledsoe, registrar, announced this week.

The scholarship amounts to \$300 for the year, \$150 for each semester. Conditions governing the scholarship are as follows:

The scholarship will be granted to a West Virginia woman of excellent character who possesses above average mental ability and personality, who has earned a superior scholastic record in high school, who has demonstrated leadership ability and who cannot attend college without such financial assistance.

An application for the scholarship must be accompanied by an application for admission to the college and a transcript of the high school record. Application forms may be secured from Mrs. Lillian H. Buskirk, dean of women.

Selection of the winner will be made by the Student Aid Committee of the College in cooperation with a representative of the Business and Professional Woman's Club.

Some few students still persist in showing their bad manners by leaving assemblies, forums, and artists series performances a few minutes before they are scheduled to end. While this offense is by no means wide-spread, it is still sufficient to cause the speakers and performers at these occasions some distraction and discomfort.

The regular assembly hour, formerly 11 A. M. on Thursdays, was changed to 10 A. M. because some students were anxious to be among the first in the cafeteria line for lunch and left early. Since this situation no longer exists, it appears that students who leave early are plainly inconsiderate of others. It distracts the audience as well as the speakers and performers.

Once in the past President Smith reminded the students of these common courtesies — these obligations — and they rarely left early on such occasions. Since some of the older students may have forgotten and because some of the new students may not be aware of this obligation, it is being brought to their attention.

MARSHALL CAGERS WIN 16 CONTESTS

"Well, we won the first, last and all home games, even if we did lose a dozen along the way," just about sums up Marshall's 1948-49 basketball season, which ended with the 75-47 conquest of Mount Union College Thursday at Radio Center. The Big Green's season record shows 16 victories and 12 defeats.

Captain Bill Toothman and Dick Erickson, two of the brightest stars in Marshall's all-time constellation, were brilliant in their final performance for the Thundering Herd. Toothman led the way on offense with 20 points while Erickson tallied 12 and played one of the greatest defensive games of his career before fouling out midway in the second half.

IT WAS A game band of Purple Raiders from Mount Union that battled the Big Green on even terms throughout most of the first half before falling behind at intermission, 31-25. The Alliance, O., visitors obviously had the Thundering Herd worried as Marshall failed to score with any degree of consistency.

Then, with Toothman and Erickson leading the way, the Raiders tired perceptibly, and Marshall romped to victory. The Big Green's winning margin might have been even greater had Coach Cam Henderson left his regulars in the game, but the line-up was dotted with subs at the finish.

IVAN REPPASS came in for his share of glory by connecting for a two-pointer from mid-court with seconds running out in the initial half. The shot was a one-hander from the center line and might easily be considered the most out-

Ten Thundering Herd thinclads in addition to Coach Gulickson and Manager Tommy Edmundson will make the trip to Pittsburgh via private cars, leaving Huntington Friday at 8 A. M. and returning Saturday after completion of the meet.

NAMED TO THE traveling squad following time trials Friday at Fairfield Stadium were Captain Jack Sonneborn, who will take part in the 50-yd. dash and 50-yd. low hurdles; Sammy Haworth, 50-yd. dash, 600-yd. run and broad jump; Jim Fuzzy" Artrip, 600-yd. run; Fred Tomblin, 600-yd. run Tom Oakes, 1000-yd. run; Bob Keyes, mile run; Kenny Woods, 50-yd. low hurdles; Paul Brown, high jump; Don Gibson, 16 lb. shot put, and George Thabit, 50-yd. low hurdles, 50-yd. high hurdles high-jump and pole vault.

Junior AMA Indoor championship medals will be awarded first, second and third place finishers. The meet will take place under the rules and sanctions of the Amateur Athletic Union.

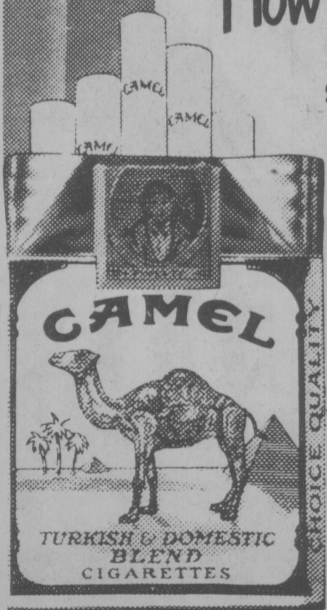
