Stuart Chase, writer and lecturer on economic and public affairs, will speak on a special assembly program at 10 A. M. tomorrow in the college auditorium. His topic will be "The Proper Study of Mankind".

Prof. Curtiss Baxter, manager of the series, said concerning Chase, "He is the foremost speaker on the assembly series that we have had this year."

Mr. Chase was born in New Hampshire, educated at Harvard and the Massachusetts Institute of Technology, and trained as an accountant. He practised this profession for some years, acquainting himself with the structure of many businsses, organizations, and government agencies.
