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Links, Court Teams Winners; Diamond, Track Squads Lose

Single victories in golf and tennis were responsible this time for keeping Marshall's spring sports program from suffering another "lost week-end." Coach Harald Olson's linksmen scored a 14½-12½ victory over Eastern Kentucky Friday at Richmond, and Coach Churchill Hodges' Big Green tennis team tripped the Kentucky Wesleyan netters, 6-1, Saturday at Winchester.

Captain Bob Burgess shot a 74 to lead Marshall against Eastern. Jack Radcliffe of Marshall and Rocco Picinell of Eastern fired 75's. The Big Green bowed to University of Louisville, 21½-5½, Saturday at Louisville.

IN TENNIS action against Wesleyan, Gordon Wooten, Marshall's number one man, went down 10-8 and 6-4 before Julian Evans of the home team but the rest of the matches went to Marshall.

The match gave the Big Green netters a record of two wins and three losses after bowing, 4-3, to Western Kentucky Friday at Bowling Green.

Marshall's baseball Big Green dropped a pair of heart-breakers to Salem and Fairmont, former state conference rivals, on consecutive afternoons. Coach Joe Binns' boys dropped a 9-8 slugfest to the Tigers Friday at Salem and then handed the Falcons a 7-6 victory by committing five miscues Saturday at Fairmont. The Big Green baseball record currently stands at five wins and four defeats.

COACH SWEDE Gullickson's track and field team was decidedly overmatched in its meet with Ohio University Friday at Fairfield Stadium and was severely beaten, 103½-23½. The Bobcats scored clean sweeps in seven events and gained 12 of 15 undisputed first places.

Captain Jack Sonneborn won the 100-yard dash in 10.3 seconds for the Big Green's only track victory. Marshall's George Thabit tied for first place in the high jump and pole vault as did Burt Romer in the vault.

Thabit was high point man for Marshall with 8½ tallies while

A swimmer may only enter two events and one relay or two relays. Medals will be awarded to first-place winners after each event.

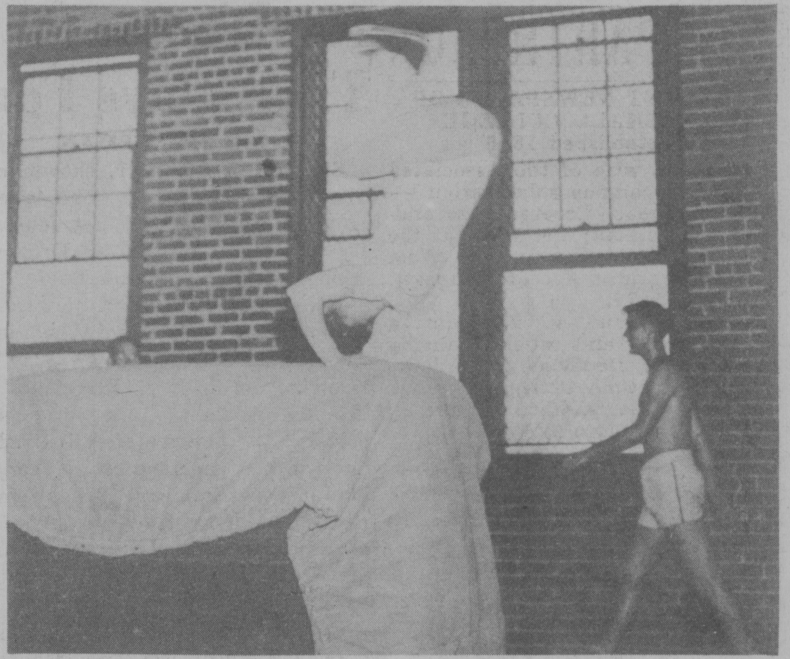
The intramural track and field meet will be run-off tomorrow afternoon at Fairfield Stadium.

PROVISIONS have been made to hard-surface for all weather play five Marshall tennis courts, three of which are located West of the gymnasium and two on the East side.

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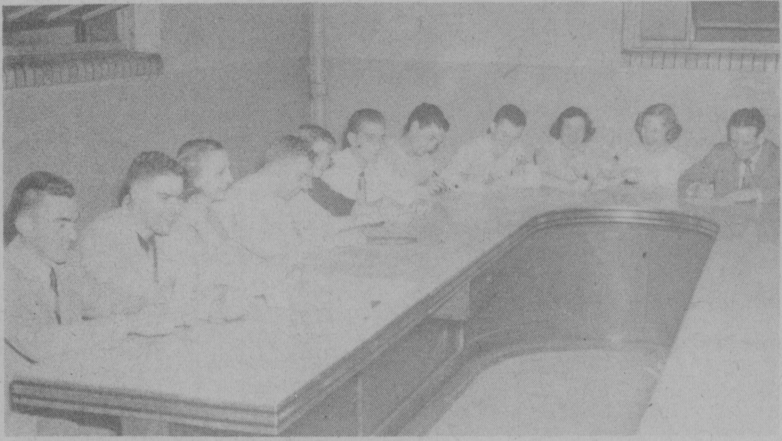

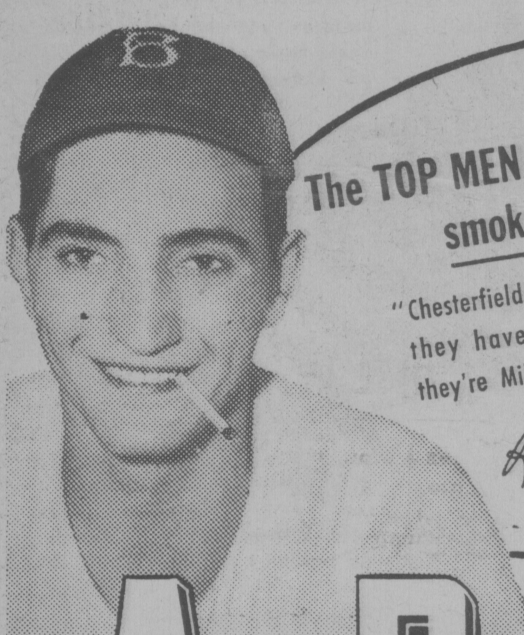
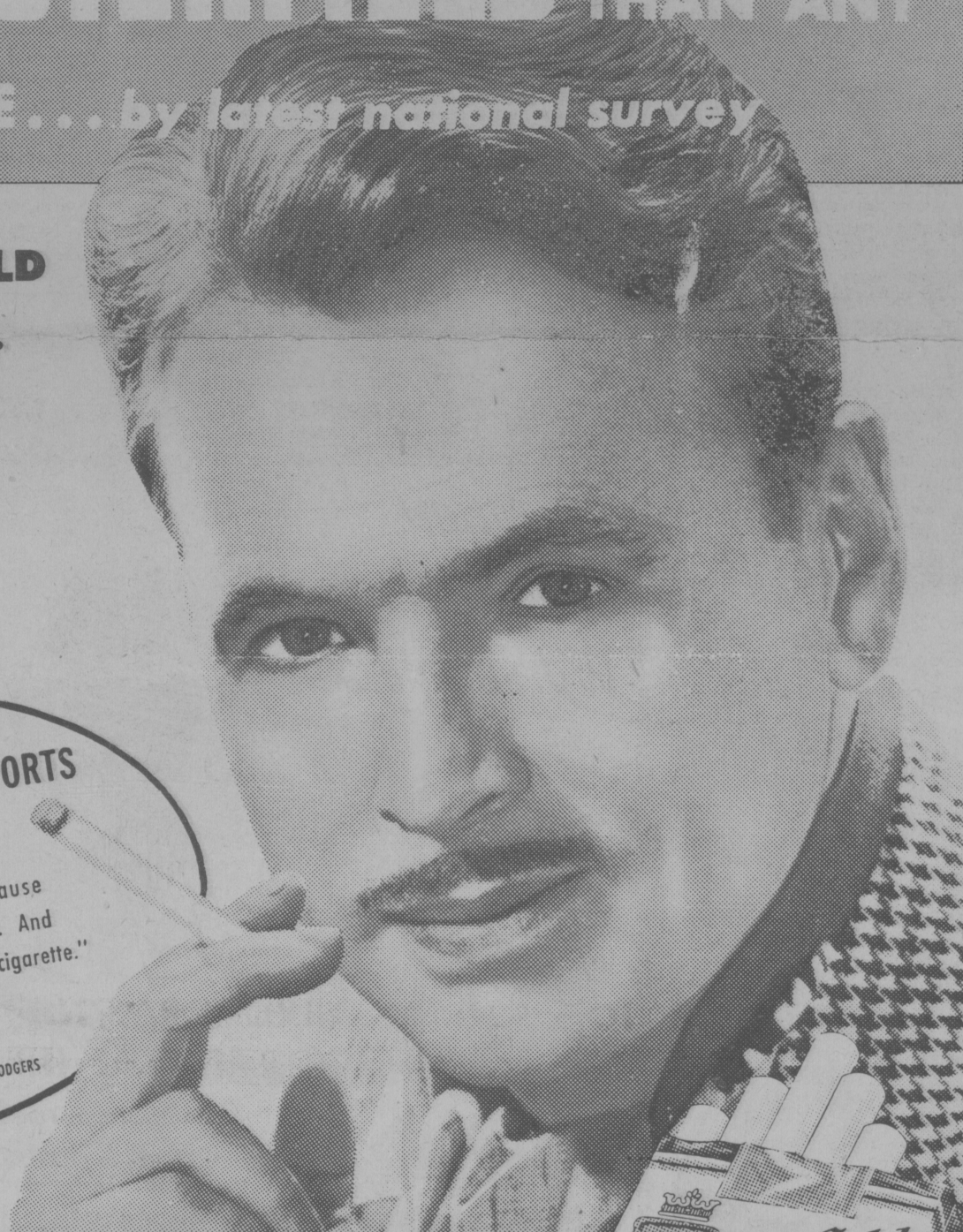
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
