At Saint Louis, Mr. Sun was a student at Washington University. Now he is going to Philadelphia where he will take a two weeks course in some phase of medicine. From Philadelphia Hung-Chuan will go on to Boston for two more weeks of schooling, and then Mr. Sun will travel back to New York for still another two weeks of school. After this period of schooling, Mr. Sun will return to China, where he will continue in his work as head of the eye, nose, ear and throat division of the Cheeloo University Hospital.

Hung-Chuan Sun received his M.D. degree from the University of Toronto, Canada, in 1936.

Charlie Sun intends to return to China in June after he receives his master's degree from Marshall.

All four varsity spring sports will be in action again this week-end as the spring program starts its final stretch.

The golf team starts the ball rolling Tuesday when they meet Eastern Kentucky here and Friday when they travel to Dayton, O., to play the Dayton Flyers.

The baseball team will make its first home appearance in three weeks Saturday afternoon when they play host to the strong Dayton Flyers at Inco Park. Game time is 2:30 and the Green will be meeting a tough foe since the Flyers defeated Salem 8-5 and Marshall lost to the Tigers 8-7.

Friday the diamond laddies go to Richmond, Ky., to meet Eastern Kentucky.

The tennis team takes off on a two-day trip Friday, meeting Waynesburg College at Waynesburg and travelling to Fairmont Saturday where they meet Fair-

mont State.

Coach Swede Gullickson's track team will make its second home appearance at Fairfield Stadium Saturday when they play host to two colleges, Davis and Elkins and Eastern Kentucky, in a triangular meet.

All of Marshall's spring sports teams are only having mediocre seasons, not because they don't have good teams, but because Athletic Director Luther Poling has lined up the best schedules that are available and they include some of the best competition in this part of the country.

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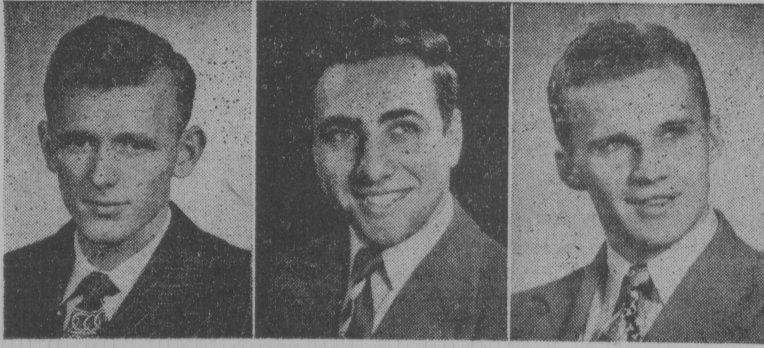
