Residence halls allocate spring semester budget

A \$4,994 budget, \$2,160 of which goes to individual residence hall requests, was passed by the Residence Hall Government Association Monday night at its regular meeting.

The remaining \$2,370 of the allocated budget will pay for overall projects sponsored by the association for residence halls sponsored by the association, according to Steve Biron, Clearwater, Fla., senior and association president. A cash free balance of \$464 will be used for additional residence hall requests.

The budget was discussed in a session that was closed to both The Parthenon and Student Body President Ed Hamrick, also in attendance. Biron said the discussion was originally scheduled to be open, but since the budget was (at that time) only in the proposal stages, many of the representatives had not seen it before the meeting.

Biron said the representatives needed to

scrutinize items on the budget, and he did not want anyone to feel "pressured" into passing it.

Each residence hall director asked for monetary allocations to provide for various activities, according to Biron. Those requests were studied and evaluated by the association's budget committee before being presented to the association, he said.

The budget allots \$500 for Twin Towers West, the largest individual residence hall allocation included. Biron said \$100 of that amount will go to stock a change machine for the building, however, and will be refunded to the association with \$5 interest at the end of the semester.

The remaining \$400 of the TTW allotment includes funds for special floor dinners, a spring cookout, a movie festival, refreshments for TGIFs between floors, and a Valentines Dance.

South Hall is scheduled to receive \$365 for an outingtpicinic, a residence hall TGIF, and aditional educational programs in the residence hall.

Marshall shortchanged

Buskirk Hall will get \$355 to be used for a dance, a backgammon tournament, "Lil' Sis' Week", and resident advisers's educational instruction programs, according to the budget.

Laidley Hall has been allotted \$350 to be spent for a spring formal, and an outingtpic-

Hodges Hall is slated to receive \$325 for a hall TGIF, trophies for billiards, horeshoe, and table tennis tournaments, an outing/ picnic, ping pong paddles and balls, and funds for resident advisers' programs.

Twin Towers East will receive \$265 to be used by several floors for different floor TGIFs.

The budget states that "all residence halls have the privilege to solicit additional funding" throughout the semester.

The overall RHGA budget includes \$520 for resident adviser programming. Each adviser gets \$8 to be used for educational insturctional programs in the residence halls, according to Biron.

Medical expenditures cover the West Virginia University Medical Center, the Marshall University Medical School, and the West Virginia School of Osteopathic Medicine.

"I've never felt the Board of Regents was making a direct differentiation against Marshall," MU President Robert B. Hayes said. "Our problem has been in communicating our needs to them, and their problem has been a lack of resources," he added.

Hayes said the BOR has been trying yearly to equalize the amount of revenue that should be granted to MU.

The BOR has been accused of treating Marshall unfairly with allocations made on the basis of full-time enrolled students.

"The allocations per FTE has not been fair to Marshall because we were behind to start with," Nelson said.

Marshall ranks with the lowest of institutions in terms of funding based on the FTE, according to Nelson.

"And it's not going to change," he added. Nelson said Marshall is placing emphasis on 2 two-year degree courses which cause the number of FTE's to decrease. And even if it wasn't, the deficits could not be made up. A common complaint levied against the BOR is that WVU receives better treatment than Marshall.

Barker said there had been progress during the period, but it had not been quick enough.

Barker said when he first came to Marshall, the school was at the bottom of the list of state institutions in terms of per student expenditures.

"It's still only third from the bottom," he added.

In terms of capital expenditures, the report quoted Barker saying Marshall is in "great shape", but it was only a matter of "catching up" with other schools.

The criticism and evaluation has been reiterated by others in more recent years.

"I think probably since Marshall and other colleges have been under the Board of Regents, on an individual basis Marshall has done better in terms of facilities," said West Virginia State Senator Robert Nelson, D-Cabell. "But it was neglected so much in the past," he added.

"It'll take years and years to catch up," Nelson noted

One of the major responsibilities of the West Virginia Board of Regents is the supervision and control of the financial affairs of the 16 statesupported institutions of higher learning within the state.

The BOR determines each institution's budget, making allocations for education and general operations, auxiliary enterprise operations, student aid and medical expenditures.

Education and general operations or the institutions include the education. research, extension and public service activities as well as the services of general admission, student servicies, library and physical plant operations and maintenance.

Auxiliary exterprise operations include providing services of a noneducational nature to faculty and staff.

Staff Writer Communications and money seem to be the major problems facing international students at Marshall, according to several administrators.

Although a letter appearing in Thursday's ssue of The Parthenon expressed negative feelings toward international students on Marshall's campus, the administration expressed more positive feelings.

The admission policies for international students are the same as for American students, according to Dr. James W. Harless, director, of admissions. The students are required to have a C average or

a degree from an accredited school, in addition to scoring certain levels on two three books used by the Office of Admissions to determine whether foreign schools are accredited, Harless said.

"International students can pass the language tests and still have trouble communicating in conversation," Harless said. "The tests cover grammar and a minimum amount of content, but this cannot determine how well they will understand individuals in conversations when they have to deal with local accents and local slang;" he explained.

Harless said that money presents another problem to international students. "They must have documentation that they can pay their expenses while they are at this university," he said. International students pay out-English language examinations. There are of-state tuition fees. "Before we can send

Faculty members consider foreign students an asset

Reporter Several Marshall faculty members are concerned with the international student situation on campus.

Dr. William E. Kingsbury, assistant professor of French sees the recent controversy (sparked by a Parthenon letter-tothe-editor Thursday) involving foreign studens as a reflection of the isolation of the Marshall community.

He said the presence of foreign students on campus is a great asset to the education process here because "they help us escape from our provincialism. We need their perspective.

Kingsbury said one of the primary reasons that foreign languages should be required to be taken by many MU students is to give American students familiarity with other cultures.

Kingsbury, also a member of the Marshall Council on International Education, said his experiences as a teacher in foreign countries led him to discover that, "criticism is a natural way of life to students in the rest of the world."

added that the majority of foreign students have been trained to think critically, and the duty of a university to inspire constructive criticism.

Kingsbury added that one of the fundamental responsibilities of all persons is to "criticize anything we see that is wrong and do what we can to correct it."

Another foreign language professor, Dr. Delores Jacome, assistant professor of Spanish, said she did not think most American students have the same opinion regarding foreign students as the one expressed in The Parthenon.

She added that foreign prejudice is a common view in many parts of the world, but she did not see much evidence of it on campus.

"Most of the foreign students I have had in class get along well with their peers," Jacome said

Judith J. Miller, international students adviser, said the students were very offended by the letter and many, including the presidents of three international organizations came in to talk to her about the matter.

Some students have trouble getting money out of their country once they have come to the U.S., he said. One of the reasons Harless gave for this is internal strife within a country, such as the current problems in Iran. The Office of Admissions will bill the embassy for the money owed, Harless said, but added that if payment is not received within one semester, arrangements are made with the student.

Dr. Richard G. Fisher, vice president dean for student affairs, said international students experience a whole new life adjustment process when they come to this country. "Language is their initial and continual barrier; they must learn not only formal English, but informal slang as well," he said.

He added that language problems may contribute to the resentment some American students feel toward the international students. "In some classes, the international students may need to have things explained more than one time. Some students may feel that this slows down the entire class and they resent it," Fisher explained.

Dr. George Harbold, dean of the college of liberal arts, said he thought the international student had trouble with language and studying. He talked about three classes designed especially for foreign students, "There are special sections of English composition and speech that are tailored for students whose native language is not English. We also offer English as a foreign language to those same students. However, the enrollments are relatively low compared to the number of students who could benefit from these classes."

Students from other countries come to Marshall's campus at such varied times that they may not receive the full orientation into campus life, according to Dr. Warren G. Lutz, assistant dean for the college of liberal

arts. "They often don't get an evaluation of their reading and speaking abilities, and may therefore be placed in inappropriate classes," he said.

"International students receive few breaks here, because they must take certain classes that do not apply toward their graduation,"

he expalined. "The handicap of language, in addition to pulling good grades, reflects the fact that we have some very bright international students at Marshall," Lutz added.

Dr. E. S. Hanrahan, dean of the college of science, agreed with the others that language may be the biggest barrier facing international students. He said he thought the only reason for American resentment of international students was their deficiency in the English language.

When asked if international students performed better than American students, he replied; "This is just a guess, but the international students may do better than Americans because they are the brightest in their countries if they are on a government scholarship."

Judith J. Miller, international student adviser, said she feels the international students have adapted remarkably well to

living in this country. "Their major problem comes in their studies and the volume of reading they must do in a foreign language," she said. "We have never had trouble understanding each other in conversation, though they are not too proud to ask questions if they don't understand what you are saying or the slang you are using," she added.

"Housing also presents a problem for them, because landlords are suspect of things thay know nothing about. When someone hears a foreign accent, they shy away and make excuses," she added.

Miller said if the Americans resent the international students, she suspects it is based on the fact that they often have a better background for technical classes. She explained that foreign students are better prepared in classes dealing with mathematics and other technical subjects.

Students refuse to speak out on foreign controversy

Although a letter published in The Parthenon recently, which contained several statements degrading foreign students, has apparently caused much resentment, few students, either American or foreign, are willing to comment.

Thursday's letter prompted 12 letters to The Parthenon Interchange Editor, but only eight of the 50 students approached by a Parthenon reporter would agree to an interview. Of those eight, only three agreed to give their names. The remaining five did not wish to have their opinions attributed to them.

Butch Bolin, Charleston senior, believed the letter "brought out a valid point." The point brought out was if the foreign students are going to speak out, then they have to do it in an American way, not in riots or by destroying things, he said.

Both our culture and their culture are enriched by them being here, according to Bolin. Bolin is not aware of any special privileges given to foreign students.

Mike Veazey, Huntington freshman does not believe the foreign students receive special treatment. Veazey has no regrets that foreign students are here.

Paula R. Trumbo, Charleston senior, believes that some foreign students do get special treatment. Trumbo believes that some are a little outspoken on policies going on in other countries.

An Iranian student, who wished to remain anonymous, said that foreign students do no. receive special privileges. The student pointed out that Marshall University has a program where MU students are sent to other countries to learn and MU pays for it.

Another foreign student believes that foreign students should have the same freedom of speech that the American people enjoy. There is "no right to tell foreign students not to express feelings about something that affects them," the student said.

"Foreign students have a right to be here. They want an education just as much as we ·do," according to an Elkins freshman. The foreign students have to work extra hard to be able to understand what they read, she said. The student believes that it is a learning experience for both the foreign student and the American student. The foreign students have a language problem, she said.

"Capital murder"

House approves death bill

House of Delegates voted 62-38 late Tuesday afternoon to approve a bill that would restore the death penalty in West Virginia. The bill, which now goes to the

Senate, would set up a class of offense called capital murder. The vote came after two hours

and 20 minutes of debate. The death penalty was abolished in West Virginia in 1965.

The House version of the capital punishment bill puts eight types of slayings in the new capital murder category for which the jury, ina sentencing separate from the trial, may impose the death sentence. In effect, the bill makes capital murder a crime more serious than first-degree murder.

W.Va. in top ten in unemployment

WASHINGTON - West Virginia had the ninth highest rate of unemployment among the states at the end of 1978, the

federal government reports. West Virginia's unemployment rate was 6.5 percent in December. Kansas had the lowest unemployment rate with 2.7 percent and Alaska had the highest jobless rate with 11.4 percent, according to estimates released this week by the Bureau of Labor

Statistics. Nationally, the unemployment rate was 5.8 percent in December. However, the national figure is adjusted for seasonal variations in employment patterns, while the state figures are not. Thus, state jobless rates cannot be compared directly to the national rate

The government said jobless rates declined from December 1977 levels in 34 states, rose in 12 states and remained unchanged in four states.

The government cautioned that samples used to compute obless levels in the less populous states are small, thus the reported unemployment rates could be off a percentage point or more from the actual jobless rate in those states.

The low bid of \$21,490,000 was opened with two others during a formal bid opening held in the Regents' offices. The low bid was submitted by Huber, Hunt and Nichols of Indianapolis, Ind., which has built several other stadiums similar to the 50,000 seat facility planned for WVU.

The Hubert bid was \$2 million less than one of the other bids and \$4 million less than another bid.

The bids were for the actual construction of the stadium, estimated to cost \$18.8 million. The total cost of the project is slated to be \$20 million, including \$1.2 million in planning and design costs.

The state Legislature authorized the project as part of a \$50 million bond issue two years ago. A new basketball arena for Marshall University was included in the package, but bids for that \$18 million project came in \$4 million over projected costs late last

The Marshall project will be rebid by the Regents.

Railroad systems vote to merge

CLEVELAND - Shareholders of the Chessie System Inc. and Seaboard Coast Line Industries Inc. voted in separate meetings Tuesday on a merger proposal that would create the nation's largest rail network.

The combined system, which would need approval of the Interstate Commerce Commission, would have more than 20,000 miles of trackage in 22 states in the eastern part of the country and extend into Ontario, Canada,

Chessie is one the largest rail lines in West Virginia and carries a large portion of the state's coal traffic.

Chessie and Seaboard last year had combined revenues of \$3.4 billion.

Plane in fatal crash had problem history

CHARLESTON - The Allegheny Airlines plan that crashed near Bridgeport, killing two people, was a modified Nord 262, a twin-engine French propjet with a history of problems, officials said Tuesday.

Three of the planes owned by Lake Central Airlines, which was merged into Allegheny in 1968, were involved in accidents in which an engine blew up in midair.


The airplane in Monday's accident was purchased about three years ago and refurbished into a Mohawk 298, an Allegheny spokesman said. The spokesman said the plane bore little resemblance to the Nords involved in the Lake Central accidents.

The wreckage of the plane was examined Tuesday by a team from the National Transportation Safety Board. The board is responsible for determining the cause of the crash. The plane, carrying 22 passengers and three crew members,


flipped and crashed after takeoff Monday afternoon in a snowstorm. The plane's co-pilot, David Baltes of Beaver Falls, Pa. was killed, as was Mary Sturm, a passenger from Fairview in Marion County. Twenty-three people were admitted to United Hospital Center in Clarksburg.

The pilot, Robert Everly of Camp Hill, Pa., was listed in serious condition at the hospital Tuesday.

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

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Watson achieves against Carolina

Perfection is an achievement most athletes get in varying degrees of success. For Larry Watson, it's playing basketball against Western Carolina University

In two outings against the Catamounts, Watson is shooting a perfect six for six from the field. His free throw attempts aren't perfect, but nine for eleven or an 82 percent average isn't that bad.

Elkins artist to visit Marshall art department


Artist Ruth Blackwell-Rogers of Elkins will visit the Marshall University art department on Wednesday and Thursday.






