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Big Green Opens Basketball Season Saturday

Jules Rivlin, beginning his second season as head basketball coach will pull the wraps off of his 1956-1957 hardwood combination tomorrow night at Memorial Field House. Tip-off time is 8:15.

Last season's opening opponent, Spring Hill, is back this year to supply the initial game opposition.

Coach **Bill Gardner**, starting his eleventh season as head coach of the Badgers, will bring with him a much taller and more experienced team than the one that gave the MAC champions a hard fight a year ago.

Gardner lost only two men from last season's varsity and has nine lettermen back from a team that finished the 1955-56 campaign with a 9-13 record.

Heading the list of the nine returning cagers is a 6-2 Ed Tebbets, a junior forward. Tebbets led the team in total points scored last year with 302 for an average of 19.6 points per game.

At one guard Gardner will have 6-0 **Bob "Whittie" Barns**, a senior and a fine playmaker. At the other guard and forward positions will be 6-2 **Gene McGuire** and 6-3 **Bob Coyle**.

McGuire is a junior and had an average of 7.5 points a game; Coyle is the other senior among the first six and had the second best average of 13.7. These three men were two, three, and four in total points scored during the season.

The Badgers have good height at the pivot position with 6-6 **Colbeir** or 6-4 **Carney** battling for the starting call. Colbeir is a junior and saw action on the varsity in '65-'56 while Carney is just up from the junior varsity team and is making a fine bid for a starting assignment.

The Badgers opened their season December 1 with a victory over Christian Brothers College of Memphis, Tennessee. Tuesday they were in Lafayette, Louisiana, where they defeated South-Western Louisiana Institute. However, scores of these games were not available to The Parthenon.

Last night the men of **Spring Hill** were in Cincinnati with the hopes of collecting their third victory over Xavier.

The Big Green made its unofficial opener Tuesday night against the Frosh and proved that they still have a scoring punch regardless of the fact that they are without the assistance of 6-5 All-American **Charlie Slack** at center.

However, coach Rivlin did not get a chance to see just how his quintet operated due to the fact that he was at the home of his mother who was ill.

Rivlin was not available to comment about a starting lineup before Parthenon deadline. However, it will probably be the same as the one used in the Frosh game: 6-2 **Cebe Price** and 6-0 **Leo Byrd** as forwards; 6-2 **Paul Underwood** and 6-2 **Dave Kirk** at the guards and 6-2 **Hal Greer** at the pivot.

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Student Executive Aid Committee Now Offers Long Term Loans

Long term loans from the college are now available to students. Loans may be obtained with no interest if repaid within one year after withdrawal from school or within one year following graduation.

If the student finds it necessary to request a second loan or one for every year enrolled before graduation he may. In this case, the student would be allowed two years to repay the second loan, three years for the third, and four years for the fourth loan.

An interest of six per cent will be placed on loans exceeding the yearly periods granted for repayment.

These loans are administered by the Student Executive Aid Committee, which coordinates all campus loans. This committee is headed by Luther Bledsoe, chief registrar, who should be consulted for further information concerning loans.

The first student mix of the basketball season will take place tomorrow night in the Student Union with dancing until 12 mid-ranges and the proper use of other gas appliances.

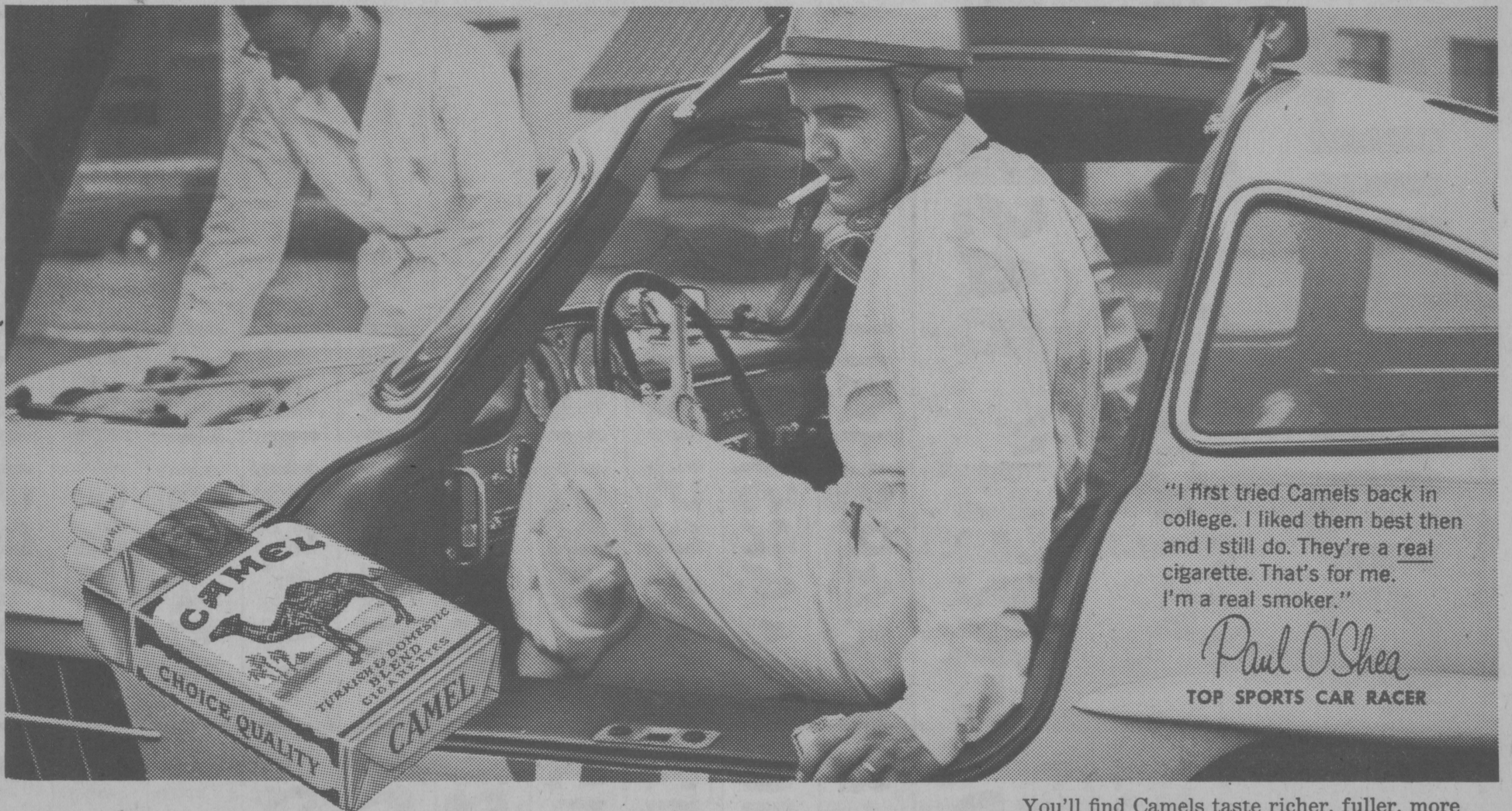

Cage Team Set For Season's Opener

Basketball season will officially open when the Big Green meets Spring Hill College of Mobile, Alabama, tomorrow night at Memorial Field House.

Coach Jule Rivlin has been putting the boys through the paces for the past six weeks, getting them in top condition for the opening game.

Returning from last year's Mid-American championship squad are four regulars, Cebe Price, Paul Underwood, Dave Kirk and Hal Greer, along with five other lettermen, Dave Dingess, Bob Ashley, Jerry Pierson, Jack Freeman and John Mayfield.

Coming up last year's fine freshman team are Leo Byrd, John Derrow, Lee Canterbury and Sonny Allen.

Named as co-captains this year are seniors Cebe Price and Paul Underwood.

Often referred to as the South Charleston "Gold Dust twins," Price and Underwood, together with the graduated Charles Slack, formed the first 20-point average trio in Marshall history last season.

Price, the ball handling middleman of the fast break group, averaged 21.2 points during his senior year. He was a unanimous all-conference first team pick. He has played in 44 varsity games, producing 948 points for a 22.3 average.

Underwood, regarded as one of the finest hand set shots in Marshall's history, averaged 20.2 points per game last year. He was named to the second team all-conference squad. Participating in 43 contests, Underwood registered 840 tallies for a 19.5 average. He scored 394 points as a sophomore and 446 as a junior.

Hal Greer, 6-2 ball-hawking wizard from Douglass High School, joins Price and Underwood to form the third part of Marshall's famous fast break. Hal finished second in the nation last season in percentage shooting, hitting on a fine 61.3 per cent of his shots from the floor.

The fourth regular returning from last season's Conference champions is Dave Kirk, 6-3, junior from Huntington. Dave finished second to Charlie Slack in rebounding last year and is expected to give the Green a big boost in that department this season.

Another bright spot is Jack Freeman, 6-1, Huntington junior. Freeman was an all-around handyman on last year's team, playing every position except center. He could possibly break into the starting line-up for the opening game.

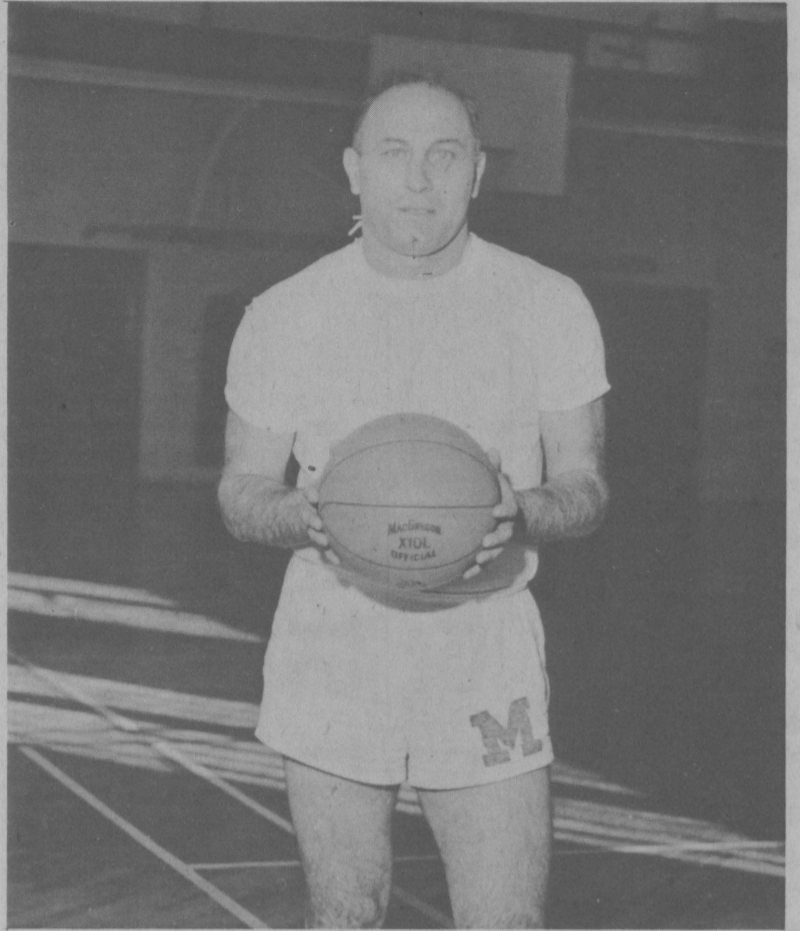
To fill in for the graduated Slack, Coach Rivlin has John Mayfield, 6-5 junior, Lee Canterbury, 6-6 sophomore, and Bob Ashley, 6-4 senior. These boys will give the team added strength in the all important rebounding department.

The best bet for a starting role from last year's freshman team is Leo Byrd. Byrd was an All-American in high school, and last season led the Freshman team in scoring with a terrific 37.3 average.

With nine returning lettermen and a group of outstanding boys up from the freshman squad, the Big Green will go into the season favored to retain its championship.

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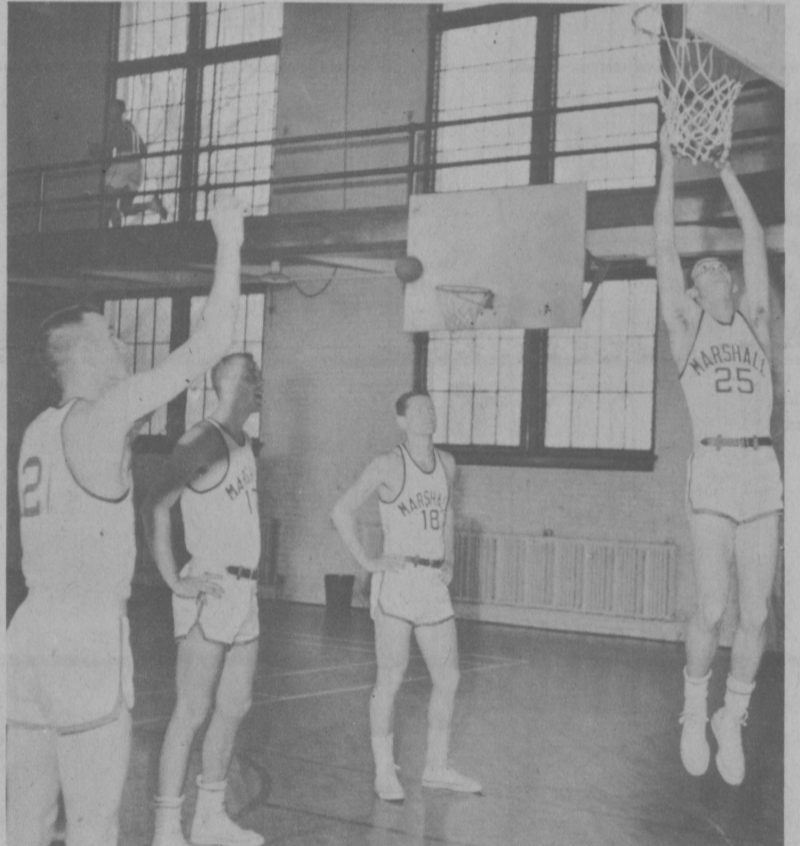

Last quarter rallies and cat whisker decisions played leading roles in four quintets hauling down their third successive victories of the campaign, in this week's Monday and Tuesday basketball games.

Racing close behind the ROTC No. 1 cagers for three quarters, the VM wreckers checked the Corps' scoring punch in the final period to emerge with a 56-55 triumph. The winners overcame an 8 point deficit in the final quarter to gain win number three. VM's Dick Custer led all scorers with 15 points.

Will Miller paced the VM with 15 points. The game's leading point-getter was Dean Thompson with 23.

Another close victory, by an identical 56-55 score was copped by the Rascals No. 2 over the Rinky Dinks No. 2 in an exciting seesaw struggle. Sparking the Racals to their third win was Bill Bias and Delmar Preston with 21 and 19 points. M. Anderson and H. Blankenship topped the losers with 20 and 16.

A determined VM Big Green five wore down a tired Toogers squad to come from behind in the fourth period to pick up victory number three by a 47-37 score.

The Misfits shut out the Sig Ep No. 2 quintet in the first quarter to grab an easy 52-16 win and their third triumph. Spearheading the winners was Linden Mead with 14 points.

Scoring only 3 points in the final period the Cavaliers No. 2 squal blew a 12-point lead to fall to the Nobodies 44-37. Pacing the Nobodies come-back victory was Charles Darwkins with 22 points followed by Bill Miller with 12. Krulich flipped in 12 for the losers.

The Rascals No. 1 team kept pace with the Rinky Dinks No. 1 cagers for one quarter and then fell behind to bow 84-46. The winners scoring a single period high of 31 points in the last quarter, were led by Larry Tyree and Darrell Maynard with 19 points each. Number one in the scoring column was Rascals' Tom Payne with 21.

John Barnhart scorched the cords for 27 points to spark the TKE No. 3 five to a 61-25 win over the PKA No. 3 squad. The winners, in gaining their second victory in three starts, held a 30-6 lead at the half. Gil Martin scored 11 points for the Pikes.

The VM Pussy Cats pulled down their second win in three games by walloping the SAE No. 2 squad 55-26. Paul Adams poured in 22 points to lead the VM, followed by Stan Malecki, 16, and John Fuget, 12. Pacing the losers was Mike Garvin with 11.

The KA No. 3 won their third game of the season with a forfeit win over the Sig Ep No. 3 team.

Giving the fans a chance to see what's in store for the 1956-57 basketball season, the Big Green of Marshall unofficially opened their season by beating an outgunned freshman team, 100-60.

Spring Hill College of Alabama will officially open the Big Green's season Saturday night at the Field House, with Morehead furnishing the opposition Monday night on the Marshall home court.

Coach Jules Rivlin missed the contest because of the illness of his mother, although a pretty large crowd witnessed the contest that showed the promise of a strong freshman squad.

Sophomore Leo Byrd, last year's freshman sensation, scored the varsity's first five points then co-captain Paul Underwood hit for six points, Hal Greer scored two foul shots, and Byrd added a fielder to put the varsity in front 14-2. Mott scored the freshman's field goal. After this point the score went to 21-3, 33-11, and seven straight goals near the end of the first half by the varsity made the score 53-18. At intermission the score was 55-21.

It is likely that Coach Rivlin's starting five against Spring Hill will be co-captain Cebe Price and Byrd at forwards, Hal Greer at center, and Underwood and Dave Kirk at the guards.

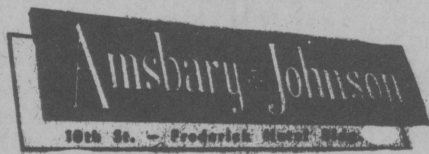

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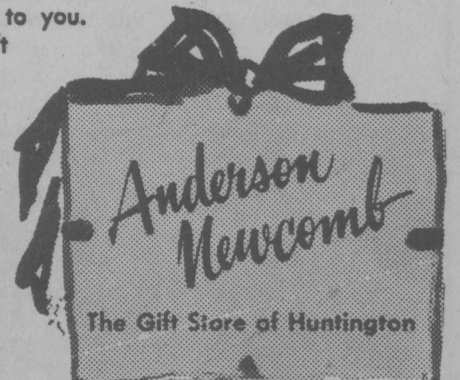
