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Big Green Opens Basketball Season Saturday

Jules Rivlin, beginning his second season as head basketball coach will pull the wraps off of his 1956-1957 hardwood combination tomorrow night at Memoriai Field House. Tip-off time is 8:15.

Last season's opening opponent, Spring Hill, is back this year to supply the initial game opposition.

Coach Bill Gardner, starting his eleventh season as head coach of the Badgers, will bring with him a much taller and more experienced team than the one that gave the MAC champions a hard fight a year ago.

Gardner lost only two men 'rom last season's varsity and has nine lettermen back from a team that finished the 1955-56 campaign with a 9-13 record.

> Heading the list of the nine returning cagers is a 6-2 Ed Tebbets, a junior forward. Tebbets led the team in total points scored last year with 302 for an average of 196 points per game.

At one guard Gardner will have 6-0 Bob "Whitie" Barns, a senior and a fine playmaker. At the other guard and forward positions will be 6-2 Gene McGuire and 6-3 Bob Coyle.

McGuire is a junior and had an average of 7.5 points a game; Coyle is the other senior among the first six and had the second best average of 13.7. These three men were two, three, and four in total points scored during the sea-






