Louis 'Satchmo' Armstrong Here For Next Artist Series Program

Louis "Satchmo" Armstrong and his All-Stars will appear on the Artist Series Monday, February 4, at the Memorial Field House. This marks the first time that the Field House has been used for an Artist Series.

Curtis Baxter, Artist Series director, said that the use of the Field House would be necessary because of "the tremendous box office appeal" of the famed musician whose golden trumpet and gravel voice have become his trademarks.

Old Main auditorium will be used for the dispensing of tickets to students Thursday and Friday, January 31 and February 1. All members of the student body may attend.

Louis Armstrong has been described as "a musician of such extraordinary ability that he is above all possible praise. His range and power are such that all other musicians appear dwarfed when compared with him."

Robert Sylvester of the New York Daily News called him "a legend in American music and certainly the greatest single figure in jazz."

"Satchmo" who is known from London to Africa and often called a "world ambassador of good will" will present the same program here that he presented for the crowned heads of Europe.

Armstrong's musical abilities are such that he is able to hold high C longer than any living swing trumpeter.

Armstrong last month made news when he "blew" the London Philharmonic Orchestra and conductor off stage in a Hungarian relief concert. When "Satchmo" played the audience cheered and called for encores until the orchestra was forced to relinquish the rest of the program to him.

Some of Armstrong's own favorite of his best known arrangements are: "Shine," "Chinatown," and "Ain't Misbehaving."

The next tournament will be at Marietta College, Marietta, Ohio, on February 2.

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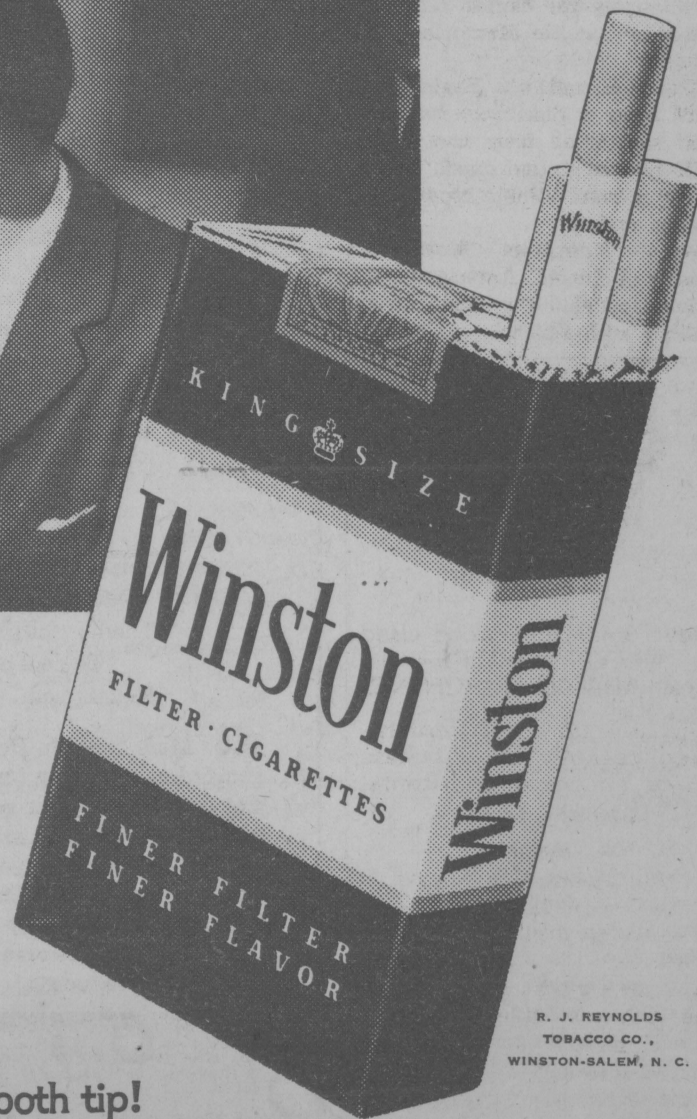


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Traveling Green Ups Loop Standing, Hope To Break Morehead Jinx Tonight

Paced by 37 and 21 point performances of Hal Greer, the Big Green cagers notched victories two and three in Mid-American Conference January 9 and 12.

The first of the two wins was played in the Field House against a determined and well coached Ohio U. team, 77-71. For a while it looked like the Bobcats might have an upset in the making as they led the Green by six points with less than five minutes to play in the first half.

But it was at this point that the men of Rivlin started hitting and by the end of the half they led by three, 38-35.

Greer led both teams in individual scoring with 37 points, hitting on 9-19 for an average of 47.3, and topped the Marshall rebounders with 20 of the 45 captures that were made, and perhaps the most exciting feat of the evening, stole the ball seven times, bringing the crowd to its feet.

Pacing the Bobcats were captain Fred Moore, who compiled a total of 26 markers.

Not to be denied were the fine performances of Cebe Price and Leo Byrd. Byrd was second in scoring with 22 and Price hit for 20.

Marshall 76, Toledo 74.

At Toledo the men of Rivlin proved they could stay in the ball game under tremendous pressure as they held on to a two point lead that proved to be the winning margin despite the fact that Toledo played their best game of the season.

Dave Kirk redeemed himself for a walking violation with the Green leading by two and only a little more than a minute to play, when he sank two foul shots that gave the Green the deciding margin.

Tonight the Big Green invade Morehead with the intention of redeeming the 81-79 defeat dealt to them by the Eagles earlier in the season at the Memorial Field House.

Coach Laughlin's Eagles, just back from a disastrous road trip that saw them drop two games, will be out to get back on the winning road. Their record now stands at 8-4.

Steve Hamilton, Morehead's candidate for All-American, continues to lead the Eagle point makers with 24.3.



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Frosh Lose First Two Games On Heartbreaking Road Trip

The Little Green plays the last of four straight road games tonight when they hit the trail to Morehead and the Eagles' frosh quintet.

Coach Dr. Mike Jacobs' Frosh, who haven't lost a home game in three years, just finished a heartbreaking trip to Greenbrier and Pikeville. The yearlings, who had won their first seven ball games, lost to the Greenbrier Keydets Friday night, 97-95, and dropped another two pointer to the Pikeville Junior Varsity, 84-83, on the following evening.

They played Ashland Junior College Monday night but the score wasn't available at press time. The frosh return home Saturday night when they entertain Cumberland Jr. College in a preliminary to the Big Green-Kent State contest.

"They were up and we were down," was how Coach Joseph explained the losses to Greenbrier and Pikeville. "Greenbrier swept us off our feet when they scored 58 points against us in the first half. We were hot but they were hotter," he added.

Against the Pikeville Javyees it was almost the same story. The frosh mentor said that Pikeville was up because their only loss was to the Josephmen here at the Field House earlier in the year.

John Milhoan continued to lead the frosh scorers average wise, but he has had to field high points honors to Herm Conner in the last three tilts. Conner hit the nets for 21, 32 and 20 points in the last three games.

Milhoan has 177 points for a 19.7 average in the frosh's nine games. Conner has 166 for for 18.4 and little Lew Mott is right in there with 146 for 16.2 average.

Wrestlers Notch Opening Win, Humble Grappling Bearcats, 30-7

The Big Green wrestling squad, coached by Dr. Sam Clagg, beginning his last season as wrestling coach, defeated the University of Cincinnati, 30-7.

The squad lost only one match, that being due to a default in the 147-pound division and drew a tie in the 137-pound division with Ken Adkins of Marshall matched against Bob Vega of Cincinnati.

Jack Young, wrestling an opponent 23 pounds heavier, still was able to pin his opponent for a 5-0 count.

The next match will be against Kent State here Saturday.

A torrid 16-bucket performance by Dean Thomas spurred the ROTC No. 1 cagers to a 69-43 win over the Nobodies and undisputed possession of third place in the "E" League with a 3-2 record. Thomas's 16 field goals was a season high and gave him a game total of 32 points to tie him with Pikes' Bob Hart for a single game output. Ray Newbrough and Gus Cleckley pitched in 17 and 16 points. The losers' pace-makers were Charles Dawkins with 16 and Jack Curran with 12.
