Dr. Tyson holds a Doctor of Philosophy degree from the University of Pennsylvania and has done further graduate work at Harvard University.

His other degrees are Master of Arts in English from the University of Michigan and Bachelor of Arts in Latin and English from Gettysburg (Pa.) College.

Dr. Tyson from 1931 to 1946 was a teacher and assistant chairman of the English department at William Penn Senior High School at York, Pa.

His position there was interrupted by World War II service in the Army Air Corps. Following military service, Dr. Tyson for the next six years was chairman of the English department at Rider College at Trenton, N. J. He moved to Kutztown in 1952 as professor of English and Department chairman

At Kutztown, Dr. Tyson also served as college editor in charge of all official college publication. He supervised student teaching in English and was chairman of the faculty committee on academic standing. He also served as a consultant in School Study Council.

The pre-registration counseling period is part of the "streamlining" of the registration process. According to Luther E. Bledsoe, Registrar and Director of Adbecause of the time that will be aid the registrar's office in the Teacher Education in the U.S.A." amount of work involved.

During the pre-registration counseling period, it is necessary for every student to consult with his advisor and have his trial schedule approved. Two copies of the trial schedules will be made. The one will be kept by the student for his convenience and the other is for the student's academic dean. In addition to this, as part of the renovation of registration, each student must choose two alternate courses on the trial schedule. The reason is that should a class that a student has chosen be closed, the student will take one of the alternate classes and thus avoid going through registration for another class. This again is a step to aid the student.

Having completed the counseling period, the student will be ready to begin the actual pre-Pre-registration, registration. however, will be conducted on January 16 and 17.

As part of the pre-registration counseling, the students are asked not to see their advisors between classes to approve their schedules, but to visit them during their regular office hours.
