Theatre Dept. Announces 2001-02 Season

The MU Department of Theatre has announced their 2001-2002 line up which will feature four diverse and award winning shows.

The Foreigner, which kicks off the season on September 26, 27, 28 and 29, is the winner of two Obie Awards and two Outer Critic Circle Awards as the Best New American play and



The Joan C. Edwards Performing Arts Center will be the location for the Department of Theatre's 2001-2002 season, which includes noted works such as "The Foreigner" and "Bus Stop."

Best Off-Broadway production. Directed by Gene Anthony, *The Foreigner* is described as "an inspired romp and a wonderful evening's entertainment."

A poignant drama based on the life of John Merrick, *The Elephant Man*, opens October 31 and runs through November 3. Merrick, a famous Victorian sideshow performer disfigured by neurofibromatosis, is the subject of this award winning play which garnered Tony Awards, Obies, The New York Drama Critics Circle Award, and the Drama Desk Award. It will be directed by Jack Cirillo.

Bus Stop, William Inge's romantic comedy about five weary travelers caught in a blinding snowstorm who take refuge in a roadside diner, will be performed February 20-23. Directed by

Gene Anthony, the bittersweet comedy has long been an audience favorite.

The season will close with Shakespeare's *Romeo and Juliet*, the much loved classic that continues to provide insights into issues that resonate with today's audiences. There have been many versions of this classic—it's been the basis for countless films, an opera, a ballet and theater companies all over the world continue to perform it. It will run April 24-27 and will be directed by Jack Cirillo.

The Department of Theatre is offering season ticket packages and discounted tickets for seniors and MU faculty and staff. Adult season tickets are \$32, while seniors (age 65 and up) and MU faculty and staff can purchase them for \$30 each. A family package, which includes 16 tick-

The Marshall University *Employee of the Month* program recognizes staff members who exemplify exceptional levels of work performance and display high regard and loyalty toward Marshall and their job responsibilities. Each monthly recipient receives a plaque and \$100. The *Employee of the Year* receives a cash award of \$300, along with a plaque recognizing this honor.

A committee, composed of at least one each classified employee, non-classified employee, faculty member, and student member, evaluates the nominations and selects the monthly honorees, as well as the *Employee of the Year* recipient.

The basis for nominating someone should include one or more of the following:

- Exceptional level of work performance
- Special contribution to the university
- Exemplifies the mission of the university
- Outstanding attendance record
- Responsible attitude toward his/her job
- Special rapport with other staff, faculty, and/or students

Each nominator is instructed to describe in detail why the employee he/she is nominating should be *Employee of the Month*, elaborating on any

incident or accomplishment pertaining to the basis of the nomination.

Profile: Phyllis Bias

A series on interesting Marshall University people.



Phyllis Bias

She can laugh now about the relay system of making coffee, one of the many memories that have studded her 22-year tenure in the Special Education program at what is now the Marshall University Graduate College.

But back in 1979, the West Virginia College of Graduate Studies, or COGS as it was affectionately nicknamed, was located in Hill Hall, a converted dormitory on the campus of West Virginia State College in Institute. A somewhat shabby three-story structure, it did lack some amenities.

"Because of the electrical system, we couldn't all make coffee at the same time. When I wanted to make coffee for our department, I had to go up and down the hall asking other staff to turn off their pots. It seems funny to have done that now but somehow it worked. Everybody cooperated and everybody eventually had coffee," she says.

And then there was the lone copy machine used by everybody in the building. "There was always a mad scramble to get to it while it was still working as it went down almost every day from the sheer amount of copying done on it," she remembers.

She's seen a host of changes occur in the college—several name changes, the merger with Marshall, three changes of locations—and with her usual calm efficiency and a great sense of humor, she's taken them all in stride.

She, along with other members of the staff, through the years became adept at packing up and moving the whole institution. In 1981 the entire college moved across campus to roomier quarters in the 8-story Sullivan Hall, another converted dormitory, named for esteemed civil rights activist, Leon Sullivan. The coffee pots finally worked all at once and there were copiers on each floor.

The final move came in 1995 when the college's odyssey ended with the staff following moving vans five miles down the interstate to South Charleston where a sleek new building and plenty of parking awaited them.

And although the early days in modest surroundings required a lot of flexibility and ingenuity on the part of the staff, they've formed a mosaic of some of Bias' favorite memories.

Her greatest luck, which set the tone for her working career at the college, Bias says, was coming to work for Dr. Allen Blumberg, known

fondly as Al by all who knew him. A man with an impish sense of humor and a perpetual twinkle in his eyes, he was revered by students, staff, and special education professionals alike.

"Dr. Blumberg was a father figure, not just a boss. He made it fun to work at the college and he taught me so much." They worked together until Blumberg's retirement in the early 1990's.

Shortly after she joined the Special Education program, her boss went on sabbatical and during his absence she had what was then one of her most embarrassing moments which she can laugh about now.

"I had just started to work when we had a major NCATE (National Council for the Accreditation of Teacher Education) review. I didn't know what NCATE was or that as part of their visit they would be looking at some student files. One morning a group of people walked into my office and asked to see some files and I told them I was sorry, but they couldn't see them. I didn't know who these people were. Nobody told me it was okay until later."

However, the NCATE officials didn't go away mad. They recognized she was merely being protective of students' privacy, an admirable trait in their eyes.

Along with the changes in locations, there has also been changes in her duties, which have also affected the staff in other programs. "It's no longer just typing memos or just answering phones," she notes. "You have to have so many more technical skills. ...We all take training classes to keep up, lots of computer classes but other classes as well."

But most staff she's worked with are patient and flexible, and like her, manage to juggle a myriad of diverse responsibilities.

She still answers the phone the old fashioned way and talking with students is one of her favorite duties. "In this position, I'm the first person a student talks with and how I answer the phone can make it or break it for students," Bias says.

And like other program secretaries, being well versed on academic and program policies and procedures is a plus for the students, Bias says. "I really enjoy talking with our students and I get along well with them. We all try to do everything we can to help them, to make their contact with the college pleasant. I try to make them comfortable and, like most program secretaries, I can usually answer about 75 percent of their inquires."

The 22 years she's spent at the graduate college have flown by according to Bias. "My daughters were in the 2nd and 4th grades when I started work and now they're married with careers and two children each and another baby due in January. I love my grandchildren dearly and I admit that I am a doting grandmother," she remarks proudly.

After her husband's retirement from American Electric Power Company, the Biases have indulged in one of their favorite pastime—travel. They visit

daughter Terra and her family in North Carolina and other relatives in Florida. But often as not it's a spur of the moment kind of thing, she relates. They like being spontaneous and as she says, "We don't always plan too much. If we want to go someplace, we just go and we always have a good time!"

She's reflective as she looks back at her years at what is now MUGC. "I've made a lot of good friends here...it's like a family and we stick together. It's been a wonderful 22 years!"
